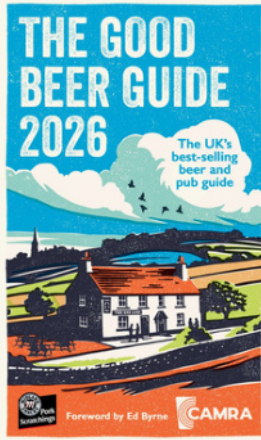

In late September, the 2026 edition of CAMRA's Good Beer Guide was published. Congratulations to the five pubs and one club in Rugby that have made it into this year's guide. Well done to the Cherry Tree in Catthorpe, the Classroom and the Unicorn in Lutterworth, the White Hart in South Kilworth and the Chequers in Swinford in Leicestershire. There is also the Admiral Nelson at Braunston and the Wheatsheaf in Northamptonshire that we look after that also made it.



All have shown that they serve consistently excellent cask ales throughout the past year and are deserved of their place in CAMRA's flagship publication. We also know that we have many other great pubs in our area that sell exceptional ales and in many other regions, would walk into the guide. We only have six entries for the Warwickshire area, five for Leicestershire and two for Northamptonshire though and the choice is both difficult and democratically chosen by local CAMRA members. Better luck next year for those that didn't make it.

The question is though; Can you visit all 48 pubs in Warwickshire, in this years guide? What a challenge it could be. From our most northerly pub in the county - the Bird in Hand at Austrey to the deep south and the Black Horse and Thirst Edition in Shipston on Stour. .

The pubs of the major towns like Nuneaton, Leamington or Stratford are relatively easy pickings. How about the Broom Tavern near the Worcestershire border or the classic Case is Altered near Solihull though. There's a whole county out there to discover

There is no prize, just the satisfaction of completing an amazing challenge. You have until September 2027, when the next Good Beer Guide will be out. So get yourself a copy and start ticking off the pubs. You only have to do one a week and it's a great way of supporting our local pubs.

## OPENING UP THE KABINETT

I know nothing about wine. I can tell the difference between a red and a white, but that is about my limit. So when a new wine bar opened in Rugby last October, I was frankly not that interested. I really should have paid more attention and have now realised that it offers the town's beer drinkers a chance to try some very unusual beers.

Kabinett on Regent Street was opened by Californian Blane Nissen and has quietly carved out a niche in what he describes as an untapped market in town. Blane has been working in the wine industry for most of his adult life. He started in the fields by pruning vines in a San Diego vineyard and has proceeded through a number of wine brokering jobs, until he landed in Britain with his English wife. His journey continued by working in London and as a sommelier at the Michelin starred Carters of Mosely. Finally in October 2024 he opened his first wine bar in what is now his home town.



The bar has always offered the choice of beers, but this was enhanced when local beer guru Matt Swinfen started supplying beers from his own range in June this year. A permanent rotating tap was introduced and brewers like Beak, Azvex, Pomona Island, Track and Mils now adorn the fridge. In future Blane hopes to run tap takeovers and have guest speakers talking about what we all love, beer.

The Black Horse in Bilton has reopened after a substantial refurbishment. All parts of the pub have been modernised to a high standard and the results are fabulous.

Food is now being served daily, with lunch and drink offers from Monday to Saturday and a two offer on from Monday to Thursday. There are still three real ales being sold, that have a CAMRA discount on Monday to Thursday. Timothy Taylor Landlord, Black Sheep Bitter and Draught Bass were in fine form when I visited recently.

## The Great Western

The Great Western at Deppers Bridge - just south of Southam - has reopened in mid September. The pub has risen like a phoenix after lying derelict for the last 12 years. This is one of the best pub news stories in years.

The pub was built around 1850 to serve the workers on the nearby Great Western Railway and the Southam Road and Harbury Station. The station may be long gone, but the pub has lived on. From the unused front door, the pub opens into what easily could have once been the station waiting room. It is now the bar, but with tables placed for dining. There is an open snug on the right and walking past the serving area on the left, the pub opens out to a large dining area at the rear. Outside there is plenty of seating on a large patio area. There is also a large cycle rack for us keen cyclists and a handily placed bus stop for buses from Southam and Leamington.

There are three real ales on the bar. Draught Bass is going to permanently available with a strikingly dazzling pump clip. The other two beers are from Warwickshire breweries, Purity and Saddleback. There is also an extensive menu selling pub classics.

Local businessman Shane Bland bought it last October and has undergone an 18 week restoration managed by Siobhan Dodd. It's most famous feature has been meticulously renovated with the help of Colin. You can sip your pint looking up to the G scale model railway engine as it trundles around the track above your head. It's fantastic to see the Great Western open again after all these years. It is especially pleasing that it's a village pub too. It's time to catch a pint once again.

## Harbury Beer Festival

This friendly little venue is in a village miles from anywhere which should work against them but in fact adds to it's appeal.

Add to this the opportunity to visit local pubs of which there are three and we managed to squeeze in the Crown and the Shakespeare both having an excellent range of cask beers on. I hope to be visiting this great little beer festival for many years to come. As we always say in CAMRA use or lose

# The Seven Stars of Rugby: A Legacy of Pork Pies, Pints, and Community

Nestled in the heart of Albert Square, Rugby, the Seven Stars pub has stood as a beacon of warmth, tradition, and real ale since the 19th century. Its story begins in the 1860s when it was established as a beer house, selling ale alongside bread as the then owner, Samuel Chester, was a baker. By 1875 the pub had been taken over by William Goode, a local pork butcher whose passion for crafting sausages and pork pies laid the foundation for a legacy that continues to this day. William Goode wasn't just a publican, he was a master butcher crafting pork pies & sausages, which were no doubt served alongside a pint of traditional ale & convivial conversation.

## Ales, Awards, and Atmosphere

Fast forward to the present, and the Seven Stars remains a cornerstone of Rugby's pub scene. Known for its exceptional cask ales, the pub has earned accolades from CAMRA (Campaign for Real Ale), including multiple "Pub of the Year" awards. Its back bar offers a quiet retreat, while the front buzzes with events, live music, and the unmistakable hum of good conversation.

## History Repeats Itself: Graham's Homemade Fare

In a delightful twist of fate, the current landlord, Graham, has revived William Goode's culinary tradition. With a background in catering and a deep love for real ale, Graham now handcrafts his own pork pies. His Scotch eggs and sausage rolls have also become local favourites, echoing the spirit of Goode's original offerings.

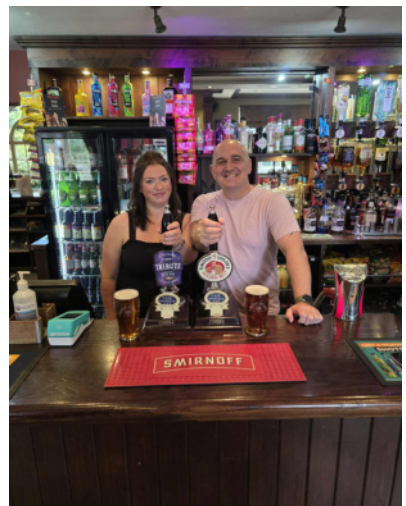

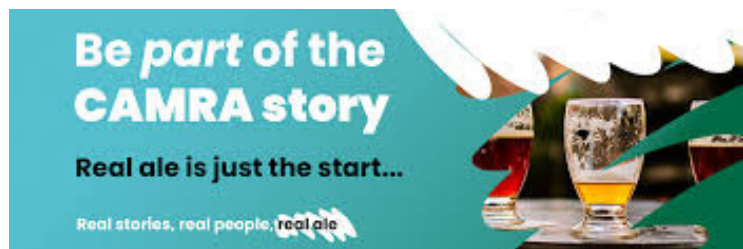

## WILD ABOUT BEER?

Those of you who know who we are, won't be surprised that our first article is a little 'off-piste' - because that's what we do.

We suspect that readers of Inn Touch know exactly how most beers are made, using malted barley, traditional hop varieties such as Goldings and Fuggles and yeast. But over the past twenty years we've seen the growth of crisper hoppier beers – Citra, Mosaic, Simcoe and a multitude of new strains of hops rising in popularity. Malts have also become more diverse, but Caramalt still dominates among the big-name brewers, and brewer's yeast (*Saccharomyces*) has remained relatively consistent. But what happens if you allow wild, natural yeasts loose on your prized wort?

For centuries, natural fermentation was the only option, and although it has been an enduring part of the Belgian and Scandinavian brewing scene - some of you will be familiar with lambics and guezes - the naturally sour notes and flavours that develop, can be divisive.



This type of brewing almost completely disappeared from the UK, but a handful of brewers have kept this natural style going, and with the emergence of deliberately 'sour' beers in the last 15 years have produced a renewed interest in this category.

Whilst most modern brewers typically use commercially refined yeasts to deliberately create this style, naturally exposing the wort to airborne strains produces results that can be very distinctive (and unpredictable).

Brettanomyces yeast tends to produce some earthy, dusty notes, while Lactobacillus and Pediococcus produce distinctly sour notes – think old-school scrumpy cider – and these beers often have the addition of fruits such as cherries, apricots and plums to soften them slightly, and give a delicious tartness.

Ten years ago, Genevieve and Jonny Mills started brewing their ‘wild’ beers in Gloucestershire, using whole leaf hops and floor malted grains, eschewing temperature control and storing their beers for 2 to 4 years in barrels that have contained wines, spirits and ciders – then blending barrels together to produce lightly sparkling beers that continue to bottle condition after they’ve found their way to Kabinett Vinbar on Regent Street. Hopefully we’ll have a ‘meet the brewer’ evening with Mills in the near future as a member of the family is a Rugby resident, but for now you’re very welcome to come and try some truly exciting wild beer with us
